Since our spring update, it has been comforting to see some small, yet significant steps towards reintroducing visiting at some Wren Retirement Living Care Homes. This has reflected a downward trend in cases of COVID-19 in both residents and the staff population at our homes.

I know that the last few months have been incredibly tough on relatives, our team members, and most concerningly, our residents. Throughout this period of visiting restrictions, the wellbeing of our residents has been at the forefront of my mind. Our teams have been incredibly creative in finding ways to keep residents in touch with both their loved ones and their local communities. However, while video calls and phone calls have been a great way to stay connected, it just isn't the same as meeting in person.

The decision to close our homes to all visitors was not an easy one to make, but it was the right thing to do to protect those in our care. The recent downward trend in infections in Wren Retirement Living Care Homes shows that the hard work, determination, and the emotional sacrifices made by all involved have paid off.

It has been heart-warming to see some of our residents reunited with loved ones in our safe outside visiting areas where this is possible. Although this great, but carefully managed freedom, has sadly not yet reached all of our residents, we are planning ways to further open our homes to visitors when it is safe to do so.

That said, we do now find ourselves in a climate of localised increases in confirmed cases of COVID-19 and local lockdowns. As we have seen recently in Leicester the North East and the North West, the situation can change rapidly, and should there be evidence of a 'hotspot' in a local area, care

homes must respond rapidly and impose visiting restrictions for the protection of residents and staff. I want to reassure you that any decision to impose visiting restrictions will be reviewed at least every 2 weeks or as further announcements are made by Central Government and Directors of Public Health. They will also be subject to a thorough risk assessment.

I am also exceptionally grateful to our residents and their loved ones for the patience, compassion and loyalty shown to our teams in the past few months. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the hard-working head office team, who have continued to support each of our care homes while facing the challenges of working from home.

Finally, I would like to thank you for your patience and understanding and hope that you and your family are keeping well at this difficult time.
