The Promise of Spring

Since our last full newsletter in the Autumn, it has been wonderful to see some significant steps forward in the fight against this pandemic we have been facing for the past year. With a roadmap out of lockdown and the lighter and warmer days of Spring just around the corner, there is a great deal of promise on the horizon. Firstly, lateral flow testing has become fully integrated into the weekly testing programme for our staff. Our teams now have two lateral flow tests a week in addition to the more longstanding weekly PCR test. With dedicated team members who have completed the necessary training and competency assessments, and who have put lateral flow testing into practice for staff in the last few months, we have been able to easily extend this to the new nominated visiting programme.

I am pleased to say that the first nominated indoor visitors have now been reunited with loved ones at the majority of our care homes. While some may have to wait a little longer, we are working with our teams at these homes to ensure they are ready to start welcoming nominated

visitors as soon as it is safe to do so. As always, for the most up-to-date visiting arrangements for your local care home, please contact your home manager.

In another considerable leap forward, the national COVID-19 vaccination programme is gathering great speed. As you will read later in this newsletter, the uptake of the vaccination has been excellent amongst both residents and staff in our care homes. There are, of course, circumstances meaning that not everyone will be able to have the vaccine, but I would like to extend my sincere thanks to those who have taken up the offer of a vaccination. I believe it is a considerable step towards the return to normality we would all like to see. I have been heartened to see some delightful feedback for our staff on Carehome.co.uk and on Google reviews over the past few months. These kind words of encouragement are always shared with our teams and really do mean a lot in these difficult circumstances. Across the portfolio of Wren Retirement Living homes, 95 residents and 130

members of staff have received their first vaccine dose.
